

Advocacy Update Tommie Farrell, BSN, RNC-NIC

By the time this newsletter is published, we will have experienced a historic midterm election cycle based on participation alone. Engagement in politics can be important, but lets not lose sight of our own focus in healthcare. Healthcare policy is not politics. Sometimes it seems that they are intertwined, but it is important for us to identify when to wade into a political skirmish, or when it is best to find the small part that we own in order to ensure the best possible outcomes for patients.

Here are some ways to engage in advocacy and guess what?! You do most of this every single day.

- Social Media: Do you promote best practices in breastfeeding, immunizations, and yearly flu shots when you "like," post, or retweet/tweet? You are an ADVOCATE.
- Work Environment: Do you educate your families about "best practice" around hand washing, use of medical equipment, infection control, or anything else? You are an ADVOCATE.
- Personal Life: How often have you been asked for your opinion about health concerns in your family or in the school drop-off line? Do you pause, reflect, and give your "best practice" answer? You are an ADVOCATE.

Everyone looks to NURSES for their thoughts and opinions as we are the most trusted profession! We model great behaviors in caring for America's patients. DVANN Fall Conference Awards

Please take a look at this year's award winners! Below are details on criteria for the award, what they will be receiving, and their nomination write-up.

International Community Service Award: Morgan Oceanak

<u>Purpose</u>: To recognize and encourage nurses who provide volunteer outreach health assessment, treatment, and/or education to the international community.

Award: \$500 award and recognition in DVANN's Preemie Press.



Morgan's Nomination: Morgan volunteered through Love Volunteers in Cape Town South Africa for two weeks in a government funded health clinic. Morgan had a huge impact on the lives of those less fortunate in Cape Town. Most of the medical projects supported by the program are government funded local clinical facilities for people who cannot afford private medical care, and are severely understaffed and underfunded, with a lack of vital resources. Morgan volunteered through providing assessments, weights, vitals, vaccines, wound care, etc. Through her efforts, she helped to support the impoverished and disadvantaged people in

the Cape Town community, making this a very rewarding experience that will serve her well as she works towards obtaining her advanced degree as a nurse anesthetist.

Professional Development Award: Michele Farley

<u>Purpose</u>: To recognize and encourage professional development in neonatal nursing.

<u>Award</u>: \$500 award, a complimentary DVANN conference registration, and recognition in the *Preemie Press.*



Michele's Nomination: Currently, Michele is pursuing a degree from Wilmington University (Masters of Science in Nursing Leadership, Executive Track) to further her professional development as a nurse leader. She is passionate about neonatal nursing and ensures that she holding the highest standards of evidenced- based neonatal nursing practice and education by being a certified NICU nurse (RNC-NIC) as well as serves on her hospital's shared governance as a department chair. She holds monthly hospital wide meetings as well as dedicates half of her clinical time as Quality Practice and Patient Safety Chair in which she promotes the best possible patient outcomes through the presentation and discussion of clinical practice and practice related information, evidence based quality improvements, and safety

initiatives. Michele plans to use this award towards furthering her education by obtaining her MSN in Nursing Leadership at Wilmington University with an anticipated graduation date of June 2020. This money will help to lessen the financial burden of going to school as well as support her as she advances her professional development.
